UKRAINE

At their Spring General Meeting, which concluded in Maynooth on Wednesday 9th March. Bishops praised the charitable efforts of people across the country and asked that a special collection be taken up in parishes next Sunday 27th

Bishops said. "Already millions of people have been forced to flee their homes as refugees. It is a source of inspiration that people all over Ireland are responding with customary generosity to support humanitarian efforts in this crisis. Many parish communities have already established links with charitable projects to support refugees and those remaining in Ukraine. Recognising these urgent needs, the bishops are asking that a special collection be taken up at all Masses on the weekend of Sunday 27 March.

"People are also invited to support the charitable initiatives of Aid to the Church in Need, the Jesuit Refugee Service, and Trócaire. Trócaire is currently responding to the crisis through its partners Caritas Ukraine and Caritas Poland which have a strong presence in the region and can use resources strategically to the areatest effect."

LOOKING INTO THE MIRROR

There's a story told about an old farmer and his wife who had been married for a very long time. It was an unhappy marriage. Throughout the course of their day they barely spoke to one another except to grunt or to pass a comment that was usually cutting or negative. One morning the farmer was going to town to buy some cattle when he happened to meet a pedlar. The pedlar was selling just about everything, and he tried to talk the farmer into buying a mirror. The farmer had never seen a mirror before and whenever the pedlar showed him what he looked like in the mirror he was astounded. He couldn't believe how old and tired and dirty looking he was, and so he decided there and then that he would do something to improve his appearance. After buying the mirror he took it home and hid it in the attic.

Every afternoon the farmer would climb into the attic and looked at himself in his mirror, and as the time went past he made sure that his hair was washed and cut regularly and that he combed it several times throughout every day. He began to shave first thing every morning and take greater care of his skin and his teeth. After a while the farmer liked what he saw in the mirror.

However, while all this was going on his wife was beginning to get very suspicious, and one day when he was milking the cows she climbed into the attic and found his mirror. Unfortunately she had never seen a mirror before either, and whenever she looked at it she immediately thought it was a photograph of his fancy woman. 'Well' she said, 'Such a sour old blade I've never seen the like of before, and to think that he's coming up here to look at her face every day!"

The farmer's wife set off to tell the local priest her sad story. However, whenever she arrived at the parochial house she discovered that the priest had gone out on a sick call. The farmer's wife left the mirror with the priest's housekeeper and said that she would return to talk to the priest later. Whenever the priest returned home his housekeeper informed him that the local farmer's wife had called and that she had left a message for him on the hall table. The priest also had never seen a mirror before and whenever he looked at it he thought he was seeing a photograph of the neighbouring priest. 'My goodness', he said to himself, 'Such a wizened up old face. Surely the bishop should have retired that old man years ago.'

The story goes on and on, but the message behind it is very simple. sometimes when we all look closely at ourselves we don't like what we see - and in this case I'm not talking about something that the Oil of Olay can cure. There are many people in our parishes all around who have low selfesteem; who are not good at accepting compliments and who feel that they have nothing to give. In some cases this can be due to the way that they have been brought up as children, or perhaps it's because they have listened for years to family members or work colleagues continually putting

This self-esteem creed was written for young people. However, it doesn't matter what age we are, if we could try and put it into practice in our own lives every day it would do wonders for our self-confidence.

'God made me - I was no accident. I was in God's plan and he doesn't make junk, ever. I was born to be a successful human being. I am someone special, unique, definitely one of a kind. And I love me. That is essential so that I might love you too. I have talents, potentials, yes, there is greatness in me, And, if I harness that specialness, then I will write my name with my deeds... I was born in God's image and likeness. And I will strive to do God's will.
